Pastor Matthew Bode: Great God, we acknowledge that we are not always able to recognize Your ways as good

People: We confess that we are, at times, confounded;

As on Good Friday, when we commemorate the death of one so dear to us

The Savior, Christ the King.

As a seed must pass through death to sprout new life,

So Jesus Christ has passed into death.

Taking the nature of a human, a servant

He made himself nothing

He humbled himself by becoming obedient to death

Even death on a cross!

For three days, we wait with him, for death to accomplish its purpose;

For Christ's sacrifice to be made meaningful;

For Christ to re-imagine death.

We grieve, even while we are hopeful.

We wait, and as the stones seal Christ's body in the tomb, even then we say:

"Oh Death, Where is Your sting? O Grave, Where is your victory?"

And we acknowledge Your good way, the confounding way of obedience to death

That brings us toward Life and Hope.

Prayer of the Day

PMB: Let us pray, Merciful God, your Son was lifted up on the cross to draw all people to himself. Grant that we who have been born out of his wounded side may at all times find mercy in him, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Gospel - Matthew 27:32-51

³² As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross. ³³ And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), ³⁴ they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. ³⁵ And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; ³⁶ then they sat down there and kept watch over him. ³⁷ Over his head they put the charge against him, which

read, 'This is Jesus, the King of the Jews.'

³⁸ Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁹ Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads ⁴⁰ and saying, 'You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross.' ⁴¹ In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying, ⁴² 'He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. ⁴³ He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, "I am God's Son."' ⁴⁴ The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way.

⁴⁵ From noon on, darkness came over the whole land[d] until three in the afternoon. ⁴⁶ And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, 'Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?' that is, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' ⁴⁷ When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, 'This man is calling for Elijah.' ⁴⁸ At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. ⁴⁹ But the others said, 'Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him.' ⁵⁰ Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. ⁵¹ At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split.
